Mitigating Risk and Understanding Liability:


- Running any kind of business entails some risk charter schools are no exception.

Understanding Compliance and Open Meetings:

- As taxpayer funded entities, charter schools have an obligation to maintain transparency with the taxpayers who fund them.
- All boards need to hold their meetings as 'open to the public', as well as making their major documents accessible.
- When making a major decision, don't be afraid to get legal counsel involved to ensure everything stays on the up-and-up.
- Attorneys can be expensive, but they're much cheaper than being sued.
- Charter school board membership is a job with much more gravity than the average volunteer position: there's potential for huge positive change when done right, as well as serious negative ramifications when taken lightly.

Evaluating the School/Organizational Leader:

- As the board, it's your job to evaluate the school's management and leader. Perform regular and consistent evaluations to avoid any tension.
- Build a good relationship with the school leader. Your communication and cooperation are vital for the school's health.
